Senior School

Rationale

Senior School Rota:

In the Senior School the whole school meets for assembly on Mondays, whole-School Assemblies are usually led by the Headteacher. House meetings take place on Wednesdays (week A only) led by the Head of House or a Year group meeting (week B only) led by a member of the Senior Leadership Team, but are also led by the Head Girl Team, or any colleague who wishes to do so.

- Assembly is from 8.35 am until 8.50 am.
- Student involvement in House meetings is actively encouraged; each year group takes Assembly once during the year and focus groups (the mentor team for example) lead assemblies on a particular them (anti-bullying week for example).
- Staff, either as a result of departmental or individual focus, lead assemblies on a regular basis.
- There are occasional speakers: from charitable organisations for example
- Music always accompanies the lead into, and out of, Assembly.
- We expect an orderly and silent entry to and exit from Assembly.

Organisation of assemblies

In addition, we hold Spotlight Assemblies where individual pupils, or pupils in small groups, present to the whole school community about something they have a passionate interest in. We also have regular 'In my Shoes' assemblies where role models are invited in to talk to and inspire our pupils.

- Assembly is from 8.35 am until 8.55 am.
- Pupil involvement in House assemblies is actively encouraged; Houses elect their captains and vote for the charity they will fund raise for during the academic year. Each term, one House holds fundraising activities.
- Specialist staff are invited to lead assemblies.
- There are occasional speakers: from charitable organisations for example
- Music always accompanies the lead into, and out of, the Monday and Friday assemblies.
- We expect an orderly and silent entry to and exit from assembly.
